It might be our neighbors' creativity, the way the lights bring joy during the darkest time of the year, or how my children gasp when they see the incredible displays.

Of course, we have our celebration of light in Hannukah. We kindle the Chanukiah and stick them in our windows, growing brighter each night until the end. The beauty of all of these lights is how they shine in the darkness. The contrast between the lights and the darkness of a winter evening makes these lights even more beautiful.

# FROM RABBI DANIEL KAIMAN

## ■ THE REALITY

Last Shabbat, on my walk to shul on Shabbat morning, I passed a neighbor I had never seen before. I'm often lost in thought as I navigate my way to the Synagogue. I didn't really pay much attention as the two of us passed each other. A neighborly nod was all that was necessary. I made it a few steps beyond and heard him call out, "Hey."

I turned in his direction. Then he gestured to his chest, a move resonant of the way we beat our hearts on Yom Kippur. I didn't quite follow. "I'm with you." He continued, and I began to get some clarity. This was an expression of solidarity and he was reacting to the kipa which often sits atop my head.

He went on, "I don't understand all this antisemitism. But I want you to know that Tulsa loves and needs its Jewish community. I hope you feel safe."

I replied with gratitude, expecting to move on. But he had another idea.

He asked, "Do you know this history of the Tulsa Jewish community?" And without waiting for my reply went on to describe the landscape of Jewish life. He named significant contributions members of our community have made over the years. From the leadership of social service agencies and non-profits to convening important cultural conversations to innovative philanthropy, he was telling me the story of B'nai Emunah and the Jews of Tulsa.

At this point, I realized this man had no idea I was a rabbi. He continued talking, but I was lost in thought again. My kipa had prompted all of this. I'm used to being public with my Jewishness and representing our community in many different settings. But this was different. I was not representing Judaism because of my training and profession, rather, for this man I was the receptacle for a perspective on the conflict in Israel and Gaza and his processing of current events. It really didn't matter what I thought, the symbolic presence of me on that street prompted a reaction that had very little to do with my thoughts and experiences.

I know I am not the only one with an encounter such as this one. Life since October 7 feels different. Intersections of identity feel torn in many directions, and it is hard to make sense of what will be ahead at home and abroad. But I share this story to remind us that beyond our personal feelings and experiences, as an extreme minority, Jews serve a symbolic purpose in the drama of other people's lives.

My neighbor meant only good, and I'm sure ended the conversation feeling as though he had done something significant. Perhaps he had. But I share all of this to remind us our pres-

ence now as Jews often means something more than we think. We represent ourselves. But we also represent our people. None of us is required to be an expert on foreign policy or a sophisticated talking head on the nature of war. Rather, it's important to remind ourselves of our humanity. It's okay to feel distraught and confused in this moment. That's the reality of conflicts such as this one.

The story begins with the return of Franciszek Kalina to his hometown in rural Poland after having lived in Chicago for two decades. He learns that his brother Józef is shunned by the community for acquiring and displaying on his farmland dozens of Jewish tombstones which he discovered had been used by German occupying forces as paving stones in a now abandoned road.

Józef is gathering the tombstones everywhere in the settlement and moves them into his own field to survive from oblivion. Against the growing opposition of the town residents, the Kalina brothers attempt to learn more about what happened to the Jews of the village.

# FROM RABBI FITZGERMAN

## ■ GUILTY PLEASURES

One of my (many) guilty pleasures is an article I read regularly in the Sunday paper. It's not about politics or religion or literature—the subjects I **imagine** myself to be interested in—but about the Sunday habits of people living in New York City. What do they do for breakfast or brunch? Do they work a little bit, or devote the whole day to amusement? What's the social balance between family and friends?

One of the articles I read back in September was maybe about the most boring Mr. Sunday I've ever seen. If I got more specific about the subject, I'm afraid you would judge me harshly. There's nothing awful or nefarious about his weekends, but they just seemed a little tedious and commonplace. Go out to breakfast. Do some writing. Watch television. Go to sleep. These articles usually excite a tiny bit of envy, as in "I wish I could do that with my Sundays in Tulsa," but this person's life seemed pretty flat. Good career, lovely spouse, but over all, a bowl of tapioca.

There was one detail, however, that held my attention. Every Sunday, the subject and his wife spend a little time shopping at Trader Joe's. My interest quickened because I **also** like Trader Joe's. What appeals to both of us, frugal Midwesterners, is that you can get a lot of good food for not a lot of money.

What he noticed, however, went a little deeper. What he likes about the store is the weirdness of the offerings. His specific example was watermelon jerky, but every customer has noticed something different. Multi-colored carrots or freeze-dried prunes. Those great little wafers with embedded figs. There is always something different to catch your eye and lift the experience of shopping at least a notch.

The real charmer was what came next, and gave me something to think about for next year. Not all of these offerings are ultimately worthwhile. Some, in fact, turn out to be repellent, and they disappear from the shelves shortly after their debut. But Sunday Guy likes the fact that Trader Joe's "swings for the fences." If it doesn't work out, that's OK, but no one could accuse the store of timidity. It tries, it fails, and then it tries something else.

I'm sure that you can feel where this is going and write this Sunday sermon all by yourselves. Faced with dull predictability and watermelon jerky, I'll take the jerky to the check-out counter every time. What is the new year all about if not new challenges, fresh perspectives, and risky endeavors? Sunday Guy knows the answer to that one.
