ON THE COVER

The crossing of the sea is usually depicted as a straight path through walls of water standing at attention on either side. How fast are we willing to run in order to be part of the drama of liberation? Who demands that we put ourselves in peril, and are we ready to respond?

FROM RABBI FITZGERMAN

READ THIS BOOK

Alice and I are now on our second generation of picture books for children. The first were for Micah and Nina in the 1980s. Some of them now feel dated, but others work beautifully in our reading lives with Zelda, Lucy, Anya, and Bino, or at least the two who are ready to hold a book. If you are now engaging with a young grandchild, I think the world of a Caldecott classic called *Ox-Cart Man*, by Donald Hall. It's a nourishing look at values like industry, craft, seasonality, and the balance between indulgence and restraint. First published in 1979, it remains a winner decades later.

I know that I'll think the same about *Welcoming Elijah*, by Leslea Newman and Susan Gal, and published by the PJ Library. That's the project of the Harold Grinspoon Foundation, distributed by Jewish Federations around the country, including our own.

The story is straightforward. There is a boy who celebrates Passover with family and friends inside a cozy bungalow. Outside, a cat mewls forlornly, hoping that someone will take him in. At the climax of the story, the boy opens the door for Elijah, and the cat trots across the threshold, only to be taken up in the boy's arms.

It couldn't be simpler, but *Welcoming Elijah* is a picture book tour de force. Newman's story gives an authentic account of the order of the seder, just enough to enfold a young child in the rhythm of the event. What's extraordinary are Gal's rich illustrations. This is clearly a progressive American Jewish household, at home in ritual, storytelling, and community. The guests are racially diverse and depicted with loving regard. Men and women are joined in an egalitarian dream of joy and celebration. Any one of our community's kids would recognize gatherings like this, or begin to think about the possibilities of reaching across the barriers of race, gender and ethnicity. My favorite character is one of the two roly-poly zaydies, who wears perfectly round glasses and appears in three different panels. Our granddaughter Lucy has noticed a certain charming similarity.

I don't think that *Welcoming Elijah* is part of the PJ Library's distribution program for this year (some books are sold, some given away), but I know that the book is just a click away at Barnes and Noble. I could easily imagine a space at everyone's seder, filled with the simple plot of *Welcoming Elijah* and its warm and lush illustrations.

PASSOVER ABUNDANCE

We're continually moving from one thing to the next. That gives us plenty of flexibility to respond quickly and nimbly to the many opportunities and needs in our community. There's plenty we've done in recent months worthy of reflection, but I'm already looking ahead to Passover, and I want to be sure you are too. We've got opportunities to cook together through our Matza-Baking Workshop and a Macaroon-Making Experience.

Of course, to "get you through" on supplies, food, and other Passover essentials, be sure to check out **OPASSCO**, the **Oklahoma Passover Supply Company**. For longtime Tulsans, that name will ring familiar, as **OTASCO** was a regional retail chain whose roots ran deep in our Tulsa Jewish community.

On the first night of the holiday, we'll gather for a late-night singing experience led by our Artist-in-Residence Happie Hoffman. The next night we'll be running a Zoom version of Second Seder at the Synagogue, which will be both familiar and new.

And if that was all we were doing, **dayenu** (it would be enough). But that's just the beginning. On the fourth night of the holiday, we'll host a program called **The Greenwood Program**, which you can read about elsewhere in this issue. On the sixth night of the holiday (April 1), we'll welcome the author of the cookbook **Bitter**, who will help us explore one of the signature tastes of Passover and lead us through a **bitter box** tasting experience. Finally, don't forget about the Synagogue when it's time to chow down on pizza at the end of the holiday. We've got a fun partnership we'll be announcing soon. Stay tuned to our weekly e-mails for more details on all these events and more! If we do our part right, this may end up being one Passover that you hope will never end.

■ CHALLAH FOR EVERYONE!

Over the years, I have taken up the practice of baking challah for Shabbat. I've been searching for the best recipes, new toppings to try, and different braids to practice. Throughout the pandemic, my ability to braid and bake has improved dramatically. Being home to mix the dough, walk away for a few hours and then come back to finish the process has opened me up to all sorts of possibilities, and it's been thrilling and delicious.

What I love about making challah is the simplicity of it all. After perfecting the temperature to activate the yeast, it takes just a few ingredients to produce something special. By the time we get to Shabbat dinner, I look at the challot on my table and know exactly how they came to be: the time, the work, the patience, the ingredients. More importantly, it reminds me of the distinct nature of the start of Shabbat. Even if the food itself is what we might eat on a Monday or a Wednesday evening, that challah makes it unique and holy. The challah elevates our experience and signals to us, especially my son Lior, that Shabbat is finally here!

In the last few months, our Bikkur Cholim program has grown to add baking and delivering challah. We have assembled a team to bake and deliver challah to folks in our community who perhaps don't want an entire meal or just need a little show of support from their Synagogue. We see this as a gesture of tender care for our community members and an opportunity to bring a little bit of holiness and love into homes all over Tulsa.

■ THE GREENWOOD POGROM

A hundred years ago this year, White Tulsans brought death and ruin to Greenwood, one of the most vital and prominent African-American communities in the country. By the time this spasm of violence was over, hundreds were dead, and the physical form of the neighborhood was shattered. Very few households survived unscathed, and pictures from 1921 show smoking ruins.

The Synagogue will commemorate this unnatural disaster in a special seder during the intermediate days of Passover. The short service will begin at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 30, the fourth night of the holiday. The liturgy for the evening will include first-hand accounts and parallel events from the history of European Jewry. Between 1918 and 1921, pogroms in Ukraine posed many of the same questions as the race massacre in Tulsa. In fact, **pogrom** is a useful term to describe what happened in Oklahoma: an uprising motivated by politics, greed, and exclusivist hyper-nationalism, in which the state either offered a modicum of support or refused to intercede in the violence.

Like all events in this period of pandemic, **The Greenwood Pogrom** will be a virtual gathering. The Synagogue Zoom Room may be accessed at **918-583-7121** on the Zoom platform. Security controls will be in place to prevent disruption of any kind, but you will be asked to share your name before admission. The Synagogue looks forward to a meaningful and thought-provoking gathering.

■ BLATT + BLUE ON MARCH 18

The Synagogue's ongoing program on Jewish cinema and television will focus in March on *Shiva Baby*, the 2020 feature which debuted at South by Southwest (SXSW) and the Toronto International Film Festival (TIFF), but whose wider distribution was interrupted by the pandemic. Directed by Emma Seligman, the film is a comedy about a directionless young bisexual Jewish woman who attends a shiva (gatherings of mourners) with her family. Other attendees include her successful ex-girlfriend Maya.

The events of the film take place almost entirely in real time and at one location as Danielle explores her romantic and career prospects under the intense watch of her family, friends, and judgmental neighbors. The film was universally praised by critics for its bisexual and Jewish representation, while being described as accessible for all audiences, and for effectively conveying the anxiety-inducing claustrophobia experienced by Danielle.

The film has not yet been seen by general audiences, but the Synagogue has arranged a special, password protected showing, available on demand between Saturday evening, March 13, at 7:00 p.m. and Monday evening, March 15, at 7:00 p.m. There is no charge for this screening, but please check the Synagogue website for a special link to the platform, along with the necessary password. If you have any difficult logging on, please call Program Director Eric Hunker at (610) 730-5859.
